Students and staff sew masks for medical professionals

fter developing a **T**passion for sewing and fashion in middle school and honing her skills in high school, Oakville High School junior Megan Blanchard used her skills to help medical professionals during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Blanchard sewed masks for local hospitals. As of the end of March, she had made 50 masks with plans to make more.

"I was so tired of the

virus," Blanchard said. "I wanted to do something positive, and with my sewing skills, I knew that this was something that I could do to change the negative to a positive."

After taking all of the sewing classes at OHS, Blanchard enrolled in MyPath and designed her own curriculum centered on sewing and fashion. These courses helped her learn the skills necessary to make the masks.

"One of the people we donated the masks to sent a photo of a healthcare

professional wearing it," Blanchard said. "It was such a thrilling experience seeing them wearing something I created that can help her become safer with her job as she's facing this deadly virus."

The masks have been donated to Missouri Baptist Medical Center, Mercy Hospital, Siteman Cancer Center South, St. Louis University Hospital, St. Louis Children's Hospital and others.

Blanchard is one of several students and staff who

have joined efforts to make face coverings for community members, essential workers and first responders. Others include Bierbaum Elementary School counselor Nathan Perkins, Oakville Middle School sixth-grade teacher Emili Harvey, and Bernard Middle School teachers Emily Glastetter and Gail Farris. Bernard students Clara Belcher, Noah Dobbins, Jenna Jabr, Sophia Nguyen and William King also made masks, as did Point Elementary student Lexi Huber and Blades Elementary student Lillian King.

Rogers Elementary School first-grade teacher Julia St. Louis is leading televised lessons for students as part of Nine Network's "Teaching in Room 9" series.


The Nine Network is producing literacy and math instruction for children in preschool through fourth grade. St. Louis's first session was a math lesson for preschool through first-grade students.

"Making my first lesson was a little nervewracking," St. Louis said. "I love teaching, but as my students have come to learn, I can often make mistakes, lose items in the middle of a lesson, and drop things. Filming for TV was an added extra pressure. After a few bad takes, I realized I am always going to make these mistakes and I have to go with it, it is a part of who I am as a teacher."

FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT


Celebrating our seniors and our community during a difficult time

How our plans changed due to COVID-19, and how we've learned to 'go with the flow'

Those who know me well know that I am a planner. Whether here at work, a family vacation, scout trip or paddling trip, I have a plan. Needless to say, this year did not go as planned. The COVID-19 global pandemic certainly pushed us to be agile in the midst of rapidly changing information.

We started the year with a plan for engaging the community around the next iteration of our strategic plan. Thankfully, most of that work had wrapped up before the nation started social distancing. The big themes that emerged during the process were safety and personalization. Interestingly, both have played a significant role during the COVID-19 school closure. This summer we will begin to turn those themes into goals, strategies and action steps. We expect to have our revised strategic plan wrapped up in early 2021 for implementation in the 2021-2022 school year.

Additionally, our Facilities Steering Committee went from in-person meetings to tour our facilities and prioritize projects to virtual meetings. Thankfully, the group had been able to tour all of our campuses before the outbreak. The group is slated to make some final recommendations over the summer.

Summer school has changed as well. We've moved from an in-person summer school in June to a multi-session virtual summer school throughout the summer. I encourage families to register their kids for our Summer Session program. Registration is still open for the high school program and for the July elementary and middle school sessions. Facilities work in the district this summer was slated to focus on a small number of big projects. With the closure, we've been able to get an earlier start than we had planned. Summer projects include roofing work at Mehlville High School and Bernard Middle School, as well as HVAC upgrades at Hagemann Elementary. There are a few smaller projects planned, though not as many as in years prior. These projects include asphalt sealing and striping, tennis court and retaining wall repairs, and waterproofing.

This summer, our planning related to COVID-19 continues. In April, we formed a Return to School Committee, which was tasked with planning how we can deliver high-quality instruction in a variety of

scenarios. This committee continues to meet through the summer. Look for continued updates at bitly/msdr9prepares. We expect to share more plans with the community the week of July 20.

Although I do plan a lot, I did come across a concept years ago that encourages me to over plan and then go with the flow. That is what the school community has done as a whole. I can't thank our teachers, support staff, administrators, parents and students enough for the grace, patience and flexibility they've shown through this challenging spring.

Property acquired adjacent to Oakville Elementary School will help alleviate parking issues, improve safety

Mehlville School District has acquired property next to Oakville Elementary School that will be used to alleviate parking concerns. Currently, the overcrowded parking lot presents safety challenges for students and staff during arrival, dismissal and special events.

"Surveys we've done over the past few years indicate that parking is a big need at Oakville Elementary," said Dr. Chris Gaines, Mehlville School District Superintendent. While the district won't make any big changes to the property during the 2020-2021 school year, the space will be used to expand parking and improve safety in the future, he said.

The district purchased the property at 2941 Yaeger

Road on May 5, 2020, for \$290,000. The property is west of and adjacent to Oakville Elementary School.

Grab-and-go meals available through the end of June

Mehlville School District staff have been distributing free meals to children since March 23. We will continue to distribute meals to kids through the end of June.

Meal distribution happens on Mondays and Thursdays. On Mondays, families can pick up three days of meals for children 18 and under living in Mehlville School District. On Thursdays, families can pick up two days of meals.

Meals are available for pick-up at seven locations.



Meal recipients do not need to be Mehlville School District students, nor do they need to be eligible for free and reduced lunch. Children must be present in the vehicle to receive a meal.





Mehlville School District staff have prepared and distributed 28,112 breakfasts and lunches through May 18. Ana Ford, school food and nutrition technician at Mehlville High School is one of several employees who have been preparing meals during the closure.

Operation Food Search will provide additional meals in June

Operation Food Search is providing additional meals for children 18 and under. These food boxes will be available for pick-up from Mehlville High School during grab-and-go meal distribution in the month of June. Food boxes are available while supplies last and are provided in addition to the district's grab-and-go meals.

The food boxes provided by Operation Food Search are paid for by St. Louis County CARES Act funds.

"We are grateful to be able to distribute food boxes," said Dr. Chris Gaines, Superintendent. "I encourage any Mehlville School District parent who is concerned about feeding their children to visit Mehlville High School on Mondays and Thursdays in June to pick up food boxes."

Virtual Summer Session expands into July, registration is open

Due to the coronavirus pandemic, Mehlville School District is offering virtual summer school this year for students entering first grade through 12th grade.

While the June session has already started, students can still enroll in the July 6-31 virtual Summer Session. Mehlville Summer Session continues to be offered for free.

Elementary Summer Session

Summer Session for elementary school students is packed with opportunities for exploration, discovery and achievement. Each day students will start their instruction with a Google Meet with their teacher and class. Teachers will provide direct instruction through Google Meet that

focuses on skill-building in English Language Arts and math, and enrichment. Students will then work independently to complete some daily tasks offline before checking back in on Google Meet to report on their accomplishments. Parents can enroll their children (entering grades 1-5) in a morning session from 9 to 11 a.m. or an afternoon session from 1 to 3 p.m.



Middle School Summer Session

Summer Session for middle school students provides instruction in core classes including math and English Language Arts. Students will also be enrolled in two elective classes based on their preferences. Electives include Personal Wellness and Physical Education, World Culture With Food Studies Emphasis, Arts and Graphic Design, Ecology and Biodiversity, World Culture With Foreign Language Emphasis, Weather and Astronomy, Power to Change, and Engineering Design. Parents can enroll their children (entering grades 6-8) in a morning session from 9 to 11:15 a.m. or an afternoon session from 12 to 2:15 p.m.

High School Summer Session

High school students can take elective courses or recover credits in core subjects during Summer Session. High school students can take up to two classes in July for a total of one credit.


