### Students and staff show persistence, flexibility in the face of COVID-19

Since school started on Aug. 25, Mehlville School District has pivoted between two learning models in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The district started in Plan C: Connected, our virtual learning model. Slowly, students transitioned to Plan B: Blended, a learning model where students attend school two days a week, receive virtual instruction one day a week and complete independent work on the other two days. By Oct. 27, all of our oncampus students were following Plan B. Students enrolled in Mehlville@Home continued uninterrupted virtual learning.


A surge in COVID-19 cases in ZIP code 63129, the county and the entire state began in late October, and by Nov. 16, high school students returned to virtual learning through Plan C.

"This has been a year of impossible and difficult decisions," said Dr. Chris Gaines, Superintendent. "We are making the best decisions possible given each week's new set of circumstances. We do not take lightly the impact these decisions have on our students and their families."

As the district continues to respond to COVID-19, students and staff have shown persistence, grit and flexibility. Teachers have learned how to provide engaging instruction through videoconference and other technology. School food staff have ensured children have access to food. Bus drivers have delivered meals and supplies to students at home and completed special projects during Plan C.

"We would all prefer to be teaching in-person," said Dr. Jeff Bresler, Assistant Superintendent, Supervision of Schools. "But there are a few silver linings to these challenges. Our students and staff are developing greater resiliency. The pandemic has given us the opportunity to develop and improve virtual learning opportunities – which is a setting in which some students are thriving."

### In-person help for high schoolers

While learning in Plan C, students may participate in on-campus interventions with their teachers. High school students and teachers have intervention time built into their schedule each day from 9:40 a.m. to 11:55 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 2:50 p.m. Transportation is available upon request for the morning intervention time.

"Some of the students really struggle with online learning," said Stephanie Guliano, Mehlville High School math teacher. "In-person support can help them connect with a teacher. They are able to ask questions and clarify their thinking with a live person."

### Safe, free meals available for children under 18

All families living in Mehlville School District can take advantage of our free meal program for children ages 1-18.

Students attending in-person can pick up a grab-and-go breakfast on their way to their first class. They can also eat lunch for free in the school cafeteria. A la carte items and extras are available for purchase.

Families with children not attending Mehlville in-person can pick up curbside meals from any district school on Mondays from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. On Tuesdays through Fridays, curbside meals can be picked up from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at Mehlville High School (3200 Lemay Ferry Road) and Oakville High School (5557 Milburn Road). Please complete a meal request form each week at bit.ly/msdr9lunch to let our staff know how many meals to prepare.

## We hear you, and we're making the best decisions possible

The role of a school board director is to be a representative for our community in the oversight and strategic direction of our school district. In a normal year, most of us agree this means things like ensuring balanced budgets and improving academics. I also think most of us would agree that this year has been anything but "normal." The coronavirus has changed the lives of everyone in our country. Many have lost jobs, local businesses are facing unprecedented challenges, and many in our community have lost loved ones. It has upended "normal" life for just about everyone.

Throughout this time, we have heard from stakeholders across our district. These include families with students who struggle to learn in a virtual school, those who worry for their own health or of bringing this virus home to vulnerable family members, requests to resume sports to provide scholarship opportunities for our seniors, and many more. Residents who wish to speak at board meetings are requested to sign the open comments sheet that is provided before meetings, giving their address and topic of the comments to be made. Three minutes will be allotted per person. When a group wishes to address the board, the group must pick a spokesperson, and that individual will have five minutes to speak for the entire group.

Additionally, the Board of Education may host special events as needed to gather general feedback or feedback about specific items. During the 2019-2020 school year, the Board of Education used these sessions as Mehlville Listens focus groups to gather feedback specific to the next iteration of our strategic plan. In years prior, the board hosted open Listening Sessions. However, these open format events were sparsely attended.

### Analyzing a new set of data

As educational leaders, we routinely review data and make data-based decisions. Typically, that data relates to things like academic achievement and attendance. These days, our data analysis is centered around COVID-19, and it's how I start each morning.

Every day I receive a report of the new cases in our three ZIP codes. I also pull data from a dashboard with age band data on positivity rates and case rates. On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, I receive updates on St. Louis County positivity rates. Historical numbers often change with updated data, so we have to be mindful to catch those changes.


The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services provides a report on youth cases by school district. This report is released sporadically and provides the number of cases within district boundaries over the 14 days prior. The state also updates regional transmission rates, typically on Wednesdays. A transmission rate greater than 1 means that the spread of the virus is increasing in our region.

We also track what is happening with the virus in our students and employees. Each Monday, we update the COVID-19 dashboard on our website. It has the numbers of new positive cases and people required to be off campus.

Each week, our leadership team reviews the data and has a lively discussion of next steps. The decisions we have made have not been easy. Each decision creates a new puzzle that must be addressed. I often tell people that the


challenges we have faced since March probably represent the most complex problems they will ever try to solve.



### **Mehlville School District Board of Education Candidate Filing**

An election for two seats on the board will be held Tuesday, April 6, 2021. The seats carry a three-year term.

The office will be closed and no filings will be accepted Wednesday, Dec. 23, 2020, through Friday, Jan. 1, 2021, for winter break and Monday, Jan. 18, 2021, for Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Except for the first and last day of filing, filings will be taken by appointment only. No filings will be accepted when the office is closed due to inclement weather or in the event of a closure due to the COVID-19 global pandemic.

Under the provisions of Missouri Statute Section 115.124, if the number of candidates who file is equal to the number of positions to be filled by the election (two), no election will be held. However, if the number of candidates filing exceeds the number of positions, the annual school board election will be held on April 6, 2021. Per Mehlville School District Policy BBB-1, the names of qualified candidates shall be placed on the ballot in order of filing. Candidates must wear a face covering and observe district infection control rules in force at the time of filing.

### Parents share their experience with the first semester of Mehlville@Home

In August, Mehlville School District launched Mehlville@Home, a virtual program that serves as an alternative for on-campus learning. Some parents recently shared their experience with the first semester of the program.

"We have had a wonderful experience with Mehlville@Home," said Abby Reiss, who has two children enrolled in the program. "They are engaged in dialogue daily with their educators and fellow students, are actively learning and have had positive growth in the program."

The district's virtual learning plan has been continually developed since the sudden shift to virtual learning in the spring and now provides a more robust

learning experience.

"It is a viable option to traditional in-person school," said Jenna Sita, who has three children involved in the program. "It is also much different than the in-home learning we did in the spring. My kids have a dedicated teacher available to them on-camera five days a week. It holds them accountable and helps them feel connected."

The elementary curriculum for Mehlville@Home is the same as the curriculum for on-campus students. For middle and high school students, all core classes are provided along with a choice of electives. The virtual setting provides for personalization of learning to allow students to work at their own pace.

"I am impressed with how closely my children's classes mirror what they were doing prior to COVID-19," Sita said.

Both Sita and Reiss have re-enrolled their children in Mehlville@Home for the second semester of the program.

"We feel they are getting quality instruction and an opportunity to connect with their teachers and classmates five days a week," Reiss said. "You will get to know a lot about your child's learning in this program. I think you will be surprised to find a really engaging personalized educational experience occurring."

### 2020-2021 school year will be last year for traditional snow days

In the past, Mehlville School District has canceled school due to snow or other types of inclement weather. Virtual learning has changed that.

The district was approved by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education to provide virtual instruction on up to five snow days each year. Starting with the 2021-2022 school year, when our campuses close due to weather, students will be expected to log in to their Chromebooks to connect with their teachers from the safety of their homes.

"There are two benefits to providing virtual instruction on inclement weather days," said Dr. Brian Smith, Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning. "Virtual instruction allows us to provide continuity of instruction in a format our students have gotten used to during the COVID-19 pandemic. It also provides us with some additional control over the school year calendar."

The district considered using virtual snow days this school year, but in-person learning days have been in short supply due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The district is hopeful that all students could return to campus at some point in the second semester. That's why, for the 2020-2021 school year, we intend to continue to shut down even virtual learning and take traditional snow days. Any snow days would be made up starting on June 1.

In the event that campuses close, staff and parents will be notified via text, phone call and/or email through SchoolMessenger. In order to receive texts

about cancellations or events at your child's school, text the word YES to 67587 from any wireless device on file with your child's school.

Campus closures will also be announced through social media, via our district website, mehlvilleschooldistrict.com, through local television stations and other media partners. You can also download the Mehlville School District app from the Apple Store or Google Play and turn on push notifications for cancellations.

After weeks of connected learning from home, students slowly returned to campus in September and October. They were greeted with new safety procedures and by staff committed to maximizing their instructional time together.











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### Kindergarten enrollment opens on Jan. 11

Mehville offers full-day, tuition-free kindergarten to resident families. Children must be five years old before Aug. 1, 2021, to begin kindergarten next August. Kindergarten enrollment is available online at bit.ly/msdr9kregistration beginning Jan. 11.

Parents must have a Parent Portal account to enroll a new student via the online application. If you do not have a Parent Portal account or have forgotten your username and/or password, please contact your child's school. You can look up your child's elementary school at bit.ly/MSDR9boundaries or by calling 314-467-5000.

#### Step 2

Gather the following required information and documentation.

- Student(s) legal name
- For transfer students, previous school contact information
- Emergency contact information
- Parent/guardian photo identification
- Birth certificate issued by the Bureau of Vital Statistics
- Medically documented immunization/health records
- Proof of residency (please read more below)
- IEP and evaluation, if the student is receiving special education services
- For transfer students, an unofficial transcript or most recent report card

#### Proof of Residency

Unless student is exempt from the proof of residency requirement, one document from each List A and List B are required. Electronic documents are accepted if they are current and contain the information required for the district to verify proof of residence (date, name, address, applicable signatures, etc.).

#### List A documents

- Deed or Mortgage statement dated within 30 days of the date of submission
- Real estate tax receipt dated within one year of the date of submission
- Unexpired lease/rental agreement signed by landlord and tenant, including the address, apartment number and date of rental

- Landlord verification letter on property management company letterhead for month-to-month leases only (original lease showing month-to-month terms required)
- Sales contract free of contingencies and signed by all parties, provided a copy of the closing statement is submitted within 60 days of enrollment

#### List B documents

- Utility bill (water, gas, sewer, electric or trash) dated within 30 days of the date of submission including the name, service and mailing address. Trash bills will be accepted if dated within the most recent billing quarter.
- Personal property tax receipt dated within one year of the date of submission
- Unexpired occupancy permit listing all the occupants of the residence
- Government acknowledgment of address (i.e. social security, voter registration, welfare, etc.) dated within 30 days of the date of submission

#### Step 3

Begin the enrollment process by logging into Parent Portal at sis.mehlville.k12. mo.us. Look for the banner in yellow that says "Online registration must be completed for the 2021-2022 school year." Click on "View" to begin enrolling your student.

Once your enrollment has been submitted and reviewed by a school registrar, you will receive an email confirmation from your child's elementary school.

Please call your child's elementary school if you have questions or need assistance with enrollment. We are looking forward to meeting your new student!

### District continues to make progress towards new strategic plan

Superintendent Dr. Chris Gaines gave his annual State of the District address in September. While the district's focus for most of 2020 has been on COVID-19, this address provided some much-needed perspective on where the district has been and where we're going once the pandemic ends. Here are some notes from Dr. Gaines' address. You can watch the address at mehlvilleschooldistrict.com/about\_us/state\_of\_the\_district.

#### Looking back

During the 2019-2020 school year, we engaged the community in our Mehlville Listens efforts, which included in-person meetings, focus groups and surveys of parents, students, staff and the community. The purpose of Mehlville Listens was to gather feedback to prioritize what the community wants us to accomplish in the coming years. Safety and personalization of learning were the top themes that emerged through the process. We are currently drafting the next iteration of our strategic plan, and those two themes will be addressed in the plan proposed to the Mehlville Board of Education in early 2021.

In January 2019, the Facilities Steering Committee started its work to identify necessary facilities work at each of our campuses. After visiting each school and surveying students, parents and staff, the committee prioritized \$35 million in facility projects related to safety and accessibility, and restroom and parking lot improvements. We have the opportunity to complete these projects without raising taxes through a zero tax rate increase bond issue.

#### Looking ahead

Voters made a significant investment in facilities 20 years ago through the approval of Prop P. The district has identified projects that will need to be completed in the next 6-10 years as we are ending the lifecycle of some of our infrastructure, including \$30 million in HVAC work. We are planning now for how we will pay for those facilities expenses.

### **Board approves 2020 tax rate**

The Mehlville Board of Education unanimously approved the 2020 blended tax rate of \$3.8056 at its annual tax rate hearing on Monday, Sept. 28, 2020. The blended rate is similar to the previous year of \$3.7994.

The blended rate is an average rate of the residential, commercial, agricultural and personal property tax rates. It includes the \$0.04 temporary tax for Prop A, which ends in 2025. The tax rates for 2020-2021 by category are as follows:

Residential tax rate: \$3.6531
Commercial tax rate: \$3.8641
Agricultural tax rate: \$4.3656
Personal property tax rate: \$4.5374

Voters approved Prop A in April 2016, which increased the district's capital projects fund by 4 cents, with a subsequent reduction in the debt service fund of 4 cents. Prop A has a 10-year sunset, and funds are being used to complete roofing projects throughout the district.



One of the changes the district made this year is the opening of Mehlville@ Home. Around 2,000 students are currently enrolled in the all-virtual program. The district is committed to continuing to offer virtual learning for families even after the pandemic is behind us. Additionally, we are planning to continue the expansion of the Academy concept at the middle schools and the MyPath program at the high schools. All three of these programs expand personalized learning opportunities for our students by providing students with greater voice and choice in their learning.

### Real-world experiences get kids "AMPED" on algebra

The Algebra, Manufacturing, Production, Entrepreneurship and Design (AMPED) course at Mehlville and Oakville high schools is teaching students math and business through real-world experiences.

"They learn the curriculum of Algebra I while learning to run a business and make money," said OHS AMPED instructor Suzy Mueller. "We produce products after we design them, then sell them for a profit."

This school year, students have been printing decals and signs to be used in the hallways to promote social distancing, one-way traffic flow and other efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19. AMPED students have also been designing and printing face masks for other student organizations. Last school year, students designed and produced stickers, banners, posters, T-shirts and printable vinyls.

"I felt like I was actually doing something for a purpose, and it made me want to learn it more," said OHS sophomore Hailey Veninga, who took the class last year as a freshman. "Usually in math class, people say, 'we're never going to use this. What's the point of it?' In AMPED, you actually get to apply it literally."


For example, Mueller said, her teaching partner Ronald Thompson, teaches a math lesson on slope. "Then we will go into how that goes into business with supply and demand, what types of slopes are we dealing with and where is that intersect point," said Mueller. "We take that math problem and put words to it that interface the business aspect."

Potential clients contact Mueller or Thompson with a request. The teachers forward work requests to the students who handle the entire project including communication with the client, calculating cost of production, designing the

product and production. Some of the projects include posters for teachers, stickers to raise awareness for causes and T-shirts for clubs.

"You get to come up with all of these ideas and use creativity and mathematics to apply yourself in different ways," said Veninga. "We're all working together, and you get experiences you wouldn't get in a normal math or business class."

### Rogers Elementary teacher receives Excellence in Teaching Award

Julia St. Louis, a first-grade teacher at Rogers Elementary School, is Mehlville School District's Emerson Excellence in Teaching award recipient for the 2020-2021 school year.

A Mehlville High School alum, St. Louis enrolled at Mizzou where she initially majored in engineering. She had always enjoyed working with children through tutoring and summer camp programs, so after a year, she switched her major to education.

"I like learning from the students," St. Louis said. "I grow every single day with them, and every day is different. We have fun and laugh. They always keep things interesting."

St. Louis spent a year teaching in another district before she was hired at Rogers Elementary, where she has taught for the past five years.

"She is highly motivated to be the best version of herself every day," Dr. Patrick Keenoy, Rogers Elementary principal, said. "That carries over to her students having relevant, meaningful lessons each day in a joyful learning community."

Those meaningful lessons are something she strives to create because of her own experiences growing up in Mehlville School District.

"The things I remember about school are the things that were fun, different and exciting," St. Louis said. "I want to give my kids those experiences and for school to be a fun, positive place where they get to be themselves."

St. Louis was integral in the district's transition to virtual learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic. She led virtual professional development training for teachers in the spring and throughout the summer to help them prepare to begin the new school year in a connected format.

"She is a wonderful representative of our community and our school district," said Dr. Brian Smith, Assistant Superintendent, Teaching and Learning. "We couldn't be more excited for her to receive this award."
