We empaneled a focus group of community members to prioritize the projects, and we are working diligently and strategically to optimize the

use of these precious funds. Be assured that we will responsibly use the Prop S funding to update our buildings to ensure the safety and security of our students and staff.

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Academics and mental health

These unprecedentedly difficult times have caused mental health issues and learning loss. We are addressing these problems with increased mental health services for our students and staff, more academic interventionists, and increased tutoring opportunities. Thanks to our community, teachers and staff for their dedication in helping our kids succeed. Mehlville School District is under construction!

little over a year ago, the voters of the Mehlville School District approved A little over a year ago, the voters of the little over a sea \$35,000,000 bond issue for improvements across the district. We completed two small projects last summer, and we've spent the bulk of the past school year planning for projects that are about to start.

This summer, HVAC and roofing Prop S projects will be completed. Both Beasley Elementary School and Rogers Elementary School will receive new HVAC systems. Washington Middle School will receive a partial roof replacement.

Several schools will receive new security entrances, including Bernard Middle School, Oakville Elementary School and Rogers Elementary School. Rogers will also receive some safety upgrades on its lower parking lot to separate students at play from parking lot traffic. These projects should be completed by the time school starts in August.

Oakville Elementary School will also receive an expanded parking lot this summer to ease traffic congestion near the school and improve safety. The majority of the work is scheduled to be complete by the start of next school year, but some work will continue into the fall.

Blades Elementary School and Bierbaum Elementary School will also be under construction this summer as we start work on security entrances. Construction at these schools will continue into the next school year.

At Oakville High School, construction of a security entrance and renovations of restrooms at the stadium and commons will begin this summer. This work should be completed when students return in August.

Some of these projects will cause disruption for our students and staff, particularly projects at Bierbaum, Blades and Oakville elementary schools. We'll

be communicating regular updates with these school communities. You can find our Prop S Progress Reports on our website at bit.ly/mehlvilleprops and through our social media pages at Facebook, Instagram and Twitter.

We are excited to start so many of our Prop S projects this summer. We appreciate the community's support in

helping us make school safer and more comfortable for our students and staff.

District increases pay for drivers, custodians, school food technicians

The Mehlville Board of Education has approved pay increases for all support Food and Nutrition technician at Bernard Middle School. "I love being able to ▲ staff, including employee groups facing the biggest workforce shortages.

"Over the past few years, we have struggled to fill vacancies in our facilities and custodial, transportation and school food and nutrition departments, as well as for cafeteria and recess monitors," said Dr. Chad Dickemper, executive director of planning and operations. "Our staff have made heroic efforts to serve our students, and I'm pleased we are able to increase their pay. We will continue to examine salaries in an effort to attract and retain the highest quality workforce."

On average during the 2021-2022 school year, about 24% of custodian positions were vacant, about 16% of bus driver positions were vacant, and about 17% of school food positions were vacant.

Starting hourly pay for custodians is up to \$14, school food technicians and cafeteria-recess monitors are up to \$13.85 and bus drivers are up to \$17. Paid training is provided, and those with relevant previous experience start at a higher hourly rate.

Mehlville School District custodians and bus drivers qualify for a retirement pension plan; health, vision, dental and life insurance, and paid time off. Additionally, our support staff say that the work they do is rewarding.

"My favorite thing about working here is the kids," said Brenda Vogt, School

How we're empowering students to take control of their learning

Mehlville School District is empowering its students to take control of their learning in the classroom, at their school and in their futures by providing opportunities for student choice and voice.

In the classroom

A key theme of the Mehlville School District Strategic Plan is to provide students with a personalized learning experience to prepare them for life after high school. We've taken steps to achieve this goal through the creation of MOSAIC Elementary School and our Middle School Academies.

Students enrolled in these programs are presented with blended learning opportunities, including project-based learning and inquiry-based learning. Students progress through each unit using learning menus, which provide a list of items to accomplish, allowing students to complete the work at their own pace, in an order that works best for them.

At MOSAIC Elementary, students also have a voice in how they display proficiency in each standard they're learning throughout the year.

"In our math learning progressions and reading checklists, students have the opportunity to make teach and create lessons," said Sarah Bradley, MOSAIC Elementary fourth-grade teacher. "They take the standard they're working on and create their own piece of evidence to demonstrate mastery in what they're learning."

For example, students can design posters, build a product or create videos as part of their teach and create lesson. Teachers post the completed product for other students to view as part of their learning.

"The teach and create part of our learning progression is one of the ways we show we know the lesson we've been working on," said Tommy Moehlenbrock, MOSAIC Elementary fifth-grade student. "It helps me to build confidence to know that I can be informative to other students."

At their school

Students also have an opportunity to work with school administrators to guide decisions about changes to the school. Some schools, like Washington Middle School and Oakville High School, do this through a principal's advisory group.

"This is their school," said Kelly Roberts, Washington Middle principal. "The goal of the principal's advisory is to get student voice in decisions about things happening around the school and for them to come to us with student concerns and things they would like to see fixed."

At their first meeting in December, students in the Washington Middle principal's advisory group provided input on community-building activities the school could host throughout the remainder of the school year.

"The principal's advisory is something I wanted to be a part of because I like the idea of incorporating student input and being able to voice my opinion about different things going on in our school," said Olivia Shon, Washington Middle eighth-grade student.

Our elementary school students are also being empowered to make decisions for their school. Bierbaum Elementary School principal Dr. Paul Morris engaged a committee of students from kindergarten through fifth grade to decide on the design for the school's new playground.

At the district level, students from Mehlville High School and Oakville High School serve as student advisers to the Mehlville Board of Education to provide student insight into important decisions being made by the board.

In their futures

We've personalized learning at the high school level by creating different student choice programs and pathways for students to pursue topics they're passionate about and prepare themselves for the future. One of those programs is the Early College Academy.

This program allows students to graduate high school with both a diploma and an associate degree. The entire cost of the program through St. Louis Community College is paid by the district.

"I chose the Early College Academy because the degree I want to pursue requires a lot of schooling, and I wanted to get ahead," said Sam Keusenkothen, 2022 Oakville High grad. "I've had a really great experience, and I'll already have 60 credit hours when I graduate high school."

In addition to the Early College Academy, the district launched a new program, Make it Count, this spring. Make it Count allows second-semester high school seniors who have completed their high school graduation requirements to enroll in a full semester of college classes at STLCC instead of taking additional classes at their high school. Mehlville School District was recently named a top district for dual enrollment after saving students an estimated \$319,044 in future tuition costs during the 2020-2021 school year.

Prop S resolution addresses escalating construction costs

The project list for Prop S was originally created in 2020 based on the recommendations of the district's Facilities Steering Committee. In 2020, district estimates indicated that these projects could be completed for \$32 million. The district asked voters for a bond issue in the amount of \$35



million to provide a financial cushion for unexpected expenses and inflation.

Mehlville School District was able to sell \$35 million in bonds at a premium, netting an additional \$2.7 million (that will not need to be paid back). However, due to rapidly escalating construction costs and supply chain delays, \$37.7 million does not appear to be enough to complete all of the Prop S projects.

On April 14, 2022, the Mehlville Board of Education approved a Prop S resolution to address escalating construction costs. The resolution authorizes the district to use other funding sources, including federal COVID relief funds (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief—ESSER), to pay for some Prop S projects. The resolution also identifies projects that can be delayed or eliminated from Prop S and authorizes the district to seek construction management services for some Prop S projects.

Mehlville School District engaged the community in March and April 2022 to reprioritize Prop S projects. This feedback from parents, staff and community members formed the basis for the board's resolution.

Several Prop S projects are starting this summer, including bathroom renovations at Oakville High School, parking lot improvements at Oakville Elementary School, HVAC replacement at Beasley and Rogers Elementary, and a partial roof replacement at Washington Middle School. Security entrance work is starting at Bierbaum, Blades, Oakville and Rogers elementary schools, Bernard Middle and Oakville High.
